Caring for the Edithvale-Seaford Wetlands

A site of international significance

Healthy waterways are essential to our native wildlife and our way of life.

That's why at Melbourne Water, together with other groups, we are constantly tending to all the rivers, creeks, wetlands and surrounding land of our greatest backyard.

The Edithvale-Seaford Wetlands is home to many important bird, wildlife and plant species, and is listed as a Wetland of International Importance under the Ramsar Convention. It is one of Australia's 67 Ramsar sites and supports nearly 200 bird species including the Australasian Bittern, a bird of state significance and threatened in Victoria.

New management plan for the Edithvale-Seaford Wetlands

Working together with other experts, Melbourne Water is currently renewing the management plan that guides how we look after this important site.

The Edithvale-Seaford Wetlands Management Plan is renewed every seven years. It addresses threats to the wetlands and how to best protect and manage the site, balancing the needs of its biodiversity within its urban environment.
